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BIRDS, BEES, AND BABY HORSES

You may be seeing a few more foals this year than in years past—and that's a great thing! The herd is in excellent shape because of the administration of PZP, a non-hormonal contraception, over the past ten years. Mares are in optimal body condition, and the instances of birth defects due to inbreeding have gone to zero over the last couple years. It's for these reasons, as well as an ageing population, that we hope to see a bit of a baby boom in 2019.

At the time of publication, there have been five new foals born in 2019 so far—three colts and two fillies. All are in excellent health! We decided that each foal will be given a name that starts with the letter R, to make it easier to keep track of the year they were born and also in honor of our ambassador horse Roamer who died in December. Renzi was the first colt born on March 31, and named after a supporter of CWHF who is



living with several terminal illnesses. Renzi was born on her birthday! Rosie, a filly, came next. She's a beautiful chestnut foal with a big star. Rabbit was born on, you guessed it, Easter. She is a stunning little filly and we can't wait to see what color she is once she sheds all her baby hair. It seems as if she may turn out to be a red dun, which is very unique and indicative of healthy genetics. Next is Danny, a bay colt born on April 26. We made an exception to the R names for a very special reason. Danny is named after long-time Currituck County Manager Dan Scanlon, who is retiring this summer. And last but not least is Riptide, a chestnut with a star colt.

Foals stay with their parents for several years. Colts will eventually strike out on their own, usually joining up with a bachelor band before they are mature enough to maintain a harem of mares. Fillies often stay with their family harems for longer, but will eventually be "stolen" by another stallion once they are reproductively mature. All of the mares who have foals this year will be darted with PZP to ensure they do not become pregnant again with a 2020 foal. This not only helps maintain a viable population, but it also gives the mares plenty of time to recover from pregnancy, birth, and the physical stress of nursing a foal.
